Serra's story

"I didn't actually complete high school, I dropped out in Year 8. I went through a phase where I was hanging around bad people, I didn't have a home to live in. I couch surfed for many years.

There came a point when I finally reached out to a counsellor and social workers to help me find a safe place to live.

"I found studying quite challenging as I live independently and was working full time hours so that I could pay for my rent, my groceries and other bills. The study load was big, we had many assignments, many exams, and it was very fast-paced. Work experience was also challenging! It was confronting being in the hospital, caring for sick people and getting exposed to a clinical environment.

"I was shocked when I came to the end of the course because I really doubted myself as I struggled so much with the studies. Now that I've actually had time to process it, it's amazing, it feels so surreal."

"I guess I like helping people because I've been through a lot of bad experiences myself – I can relate to them. I definitely want to work with kids. Sick children, children that don't have a home. Growing up without support was hard, not receiving the love that you need as a child, but it's also made me

really strong, it's allowed me to gain independence and the drive to succeed in life.

"I would like to thank the Sisters of Charity Foundation so much for giving me this golden opportunity. It's helped me, and it's also allowed me

to help other people, so thank you."

Innovation, independence and hope

Our Community Grants Program funds a wide range of services that have developed solutions to local problems.

We help disadvantaged and under-served people by funding programs for at-risk youth, Indigenous Australians, people living with disabilities, those struggling with homelessness and poverty, the prison-affected, survivors of domestic violence and many more.

Your generosity has allowed our Foundation to support entrepreneurial organisations that have a clear and powerful vision. Fighting Chance and its sister organisations, Jigsaw and Avenue, have a vision of an Australia in which people with disability are fully included in the workforce – we have proudly supported them since 2012.

“Being different isn’t easy, and I was bullied at school – teenage girls in particular can be cruel. I hung out in the library or the computer lab,” says Sarah, who has autism.

When it came time to find a job after school Sarah, like many other people with a disability, faced an impossible challenge.



Sarah gained skills, an employment history and confidence at Jigsaw. She now has a job as Office Assistant at Fighting Chance and is excited about her future.

“I learnt a lot and did a lot of growing up at Jigsaw,” Sarah says fondly. “I gained experience in digitisation, file management and managing my emotions and reactions – I can be a stress head! I am so much more confident now and able to advocate for myself.”

Ways to leave a gift in your Will

There are three types of gifts you can choose from:

A residuary bequest

After taking care of friends and family, you can leave all or a percentage of the remainder of your estate to the Sisters of Charity Foundation.

A percentage of your estate

Leave a nominated portion or fixed percentage of your estate to the Sisters of Charity Foundation. This will remain future-proof and you'll be less likely to need to update your Will in the future.

Cash bequest

You designate a specific amount of money to be given to the Foundation.

Contingency bequest

A contingency bequest is conditional on a certain event occurring before distribution to the beneficiary. For example, your gift to the Sisters of Charity Foundation can take effect after the death of your spouse. In this way your spouse retains your estate for life.

Life insurance or superannuation policies

Subject to the terms of the policies, you can make the Sisters of Charity Foundation the beneficiary of an insurance or superannuation policy.

When leaving a gift to the Sisters of Charity Foundation we encourage you to notify your loved ones. We would appreciate it if you could let us know of your decision so we can thank you in advance and keep you up to date about areas of particular interest to you.

interest to positions in everything from hospitality work to dog walking to retail, and no one was biting – absolutely no one was biting,” Sarah recalls. “I was pounding the concrete, emailing every company I could think of, putting out resumes left, right and centre, and nothing solid came of it.”

Sarah met a careers counsellor who told her about Jigsaw, a social enterprise that gives people with disability the opportunity to develop work skills in a real business, join the workforce for the first time, and use those experiences to transition into other roles.

Happily, Sarah is now well on her way towards building a secure future for herself.

Our promise to you

- 1 We will always respect your privacy and treat your information confidentially.
- 2 We understand your family and loved ones will always come first.
- 3 We recognise it's your decision to leave a gift in your Will and you need to decide in your own time.
- 4 We would love to know if you have left a gift in your Will to the Sisters of Charity Foundation, but we understand if you would prefer not to tell us.
- 5 If you do tell us, you can decide how you would like your gift acknowledged and how we talk to you about our work in the future.
- 6 We will use your gift carefully and thoughtfully, so it has the greatest impact.
- 7 We understand that at any time you have the right to change your mind about a gift in your Will to the Sisters of Charity Foundation.
- 8 We will honour your gift with sensitivity, care and respect.

How to word your Will



If you already have a Will and would like a gift added to the Sisters of Charity Foundation, you can speak to your solicitor about adding a codicil – a short legal amendment.

If you do not have a legal advisor, we can introduce you to one to assist you in making or amending your Will, and whose services will be provided free of charge. We encourage you to seek legal advice when preparing or amending your Will to help ensure your wishes are fulfilled and to avoid confusion after your lifetime.

You may find the following wording helpful in preparing your Will.

I give and bequeath to the Sisters of Charity Foundation

(ABN 99 342 873 237) of Level 7, 35 Grafton Street Bondi Junction NSW 2022 to be applied for the purposes and objects of the Sisters of Charity Foundation:

The remainder of my estate in whatever form, after payment of any debts, liabilities and taxes and after the provisions of my Will (for my family, friends and others) **have been fully paid and/or satisfied**

OR [insert percentage here] % of my real estate property known as [insert address]..... (or shares, debentures or other assets as the case may be)

OR the sum of \$ [insert amount here]

A history of compassion and care

A brave mission

Moved by the plight of the needy in Ireland, in 1815 Mary Aikenhead founded the Sisters of Charity to serve those living in poverty.

The order was unenclosed, to allow the Sisters to walk with the poor and marginalised, offering practical relief and spiritual nourishment.

When Bishop Polding sent a request to Mary Aikenhead asking her to send Sisters to the most neglected portion of the Catholic world, she responded by appointing five volunteer Sisters to Australia.

In 1838 these courageous women began their ministry in Australia by assisting the convict women in the female factory at Parramatta. From these humble beginnings the Sisters of Charity continued to answer the call to ministry in hospitals, schools, prisons and social welfare activities.

In search of social justice

In order to promote in perpetuity the mission of the Sisters of Charity of Australia, the Congregational Leader and Council established the Sisters of Charity Foundation in 2000.

The Sisters knew that while there were plenty of government-funded initiatives and established charity organisations that helped many

in our society, countless others were overlooked. The Foundation's first initiative, the Community Grants Program, was aimed at helping smaller groups who already make a big difference to those in need, so they can have an even greater impact.

The Foundation continues to take the history and values of the Sisters forward through our social justice programs.
